RESOLUTION NO. 8/24-P ON JAMMU AND KASHMIR DISPUTE

The Twenty-fourth Session of the Islamic Conference of Foreign Ministers (Session of Fraternity and Cooperation), held in Jakarta, Republic of Indonesia, from 28 Rajab to 3 Shaaban, 1417H (9-13 December, 1996),

<u>Reaffirming</u> the principles and objectives of the Charter of the Organization of Islamic Conference which emphasize the common goals and destiny of the peoples of the Islamic Ummah;

<u>Emphasizing</u> the purposes and principles of the UN Charter and recalling the UN resolutions relevant to the Jammu and Kashmir dispute which remain unimplemented;

<u>Recalling</u> that the Simla Agreement signed between the Governments of India and Pakistan calls for a final settlement of the Jammu and Kashmir issue;

<u>Reaffirming</u> the importance of the universal realization of the right of peoples to selfdetermination enshrined in the Charters of the OIC and the United Nations;

<u>Recalling</u> the Special Declaration on Jammu and Kashmir adopted by the Seventh Islamic Summit Conference and previous OIC resolutions on the Jammu and Kashmir dispute;

<u>Expressing</u> concern at the alarming increase in the indiscriminate use of force and gross violations of human rights committed against innocent Kashmiris;

<u>Recalling</u> the Report of the OIC Fact Finding Mission on the situation in Kashmir following its visit to Azad Jammu and Kashmir in February 1993, and <u>regretting</u> that the human rights situation in Indian held Jammu and Kashmir remains serious;

<u>Regretting also</u> that the Government of India has not responded favourably so far to the offer of the Good Offices Mission made by the Twentieth Islamic Conference of Foreign Ministers and renewed by the Sixth and Seventh Islamic Summit Conferences;

<u>Further regretting</u> that the OIC Fact Finding Mission was not allowed to visit Indian held Jammu and Kashmir;

<u>Noting</u> the report of the Ministerial Meeting of the OIC Contact Group on Jammu and Kashmir and endorsing the recommendations contained therein;

<u>Taking note</u> of the strong condemnation by Pakistan and the True Representatives of the Kashmiri people, including the leadership of the All Parties Hurrieyet Conference of the deplorable act of hostage taking by "Al-Faran" and calling for the immediate and safe release of all the hostages;

<u>Taking note</u> of the Memorandum submitted by the True Representatives of Jammu and Kashmir, which inter-alia, asserts that the people of Jammu and Kashmir will not accept the imposition of a fraudulent political process in Kashmir and that the so-called political

process or elections could not be a substitute for a plebiscite as is affirmed in Security Council Resolutions No. 91 (1951) and 122 (1957);

- 1. Takes note of the Report of the Secretary General on the Jammu and Kashmir dispute and endorses the recommendations contained therein (Document No. ICFM/24-96/PIL/D.2).
- 2. Calls for a peaceful settlement of the Jammu and Kashmir issue in accordance with the relevant UN Resolutions and as agreed upon in the Simla Agreement.
- 3. <u>Condemns</u> the continuing massive violations of human rights of the Kashmiri people and calls for the respect of their human rights including the right of self-determination.
- 4. <u>Calls upon</u> Member states to take all necessary steps to persuade India to cease forthwith the gross and systematic human rights violations of the Kashmiri people and to enable them to exercise their inalienable right to self determination as mandated by the relevant resolutions of the Security Council.
- 5. <u>Affirms</u> that any political process/elections held under foreign occupation cannot be a substitute to the exercise of the right of self-determination by people of Kashmir as is provided in the relevant Security Council Resolutions.
- 6. <u>Calls upon</u> India to allow International Human Rights Groups and Humanitarian Organizations to visit Jammu and Kashmir.
- 7. <u>Supports</u> the efforts of the Government of Pakistan to initiate a meaningful bilateral dialogue for resolving the Jammu and Kashmir dispute and calls upon the Government of India to respond positively to these efforts.
- 8. <u>Affirms</u> that a sustained dialogue is essential to address the core of the problems and to remove the basic causes of tension between India and Pakistan.
- 9. <u>Expresses</u> its deep concern at the prevailing tension that threatens security and peace in the region as a result of the large scale deployment of Indian troops in the Indian held Jammu and Kashmir.
- 10. <u>Calls upon</u> India and Pakistan to redeploy their forces to peace-time locations.
- 11. <u>Appeals</u> to the Member States, OIC and Islamic Institutions, such as the Islamic Solidarity Fund, and philanthropists to mobilize funds and contribute generously towards providing humanitarian assistance to the Kashmiri people.
- 12. <u>Requests</u> the Government of India, in the interest of regional peace and security, to avail itself of the offer of Good Offices made by the Twentieth Islamic Conference of Foreign Ministers and the Sixth and Seventh Islamic Summit Conferences.
- 13. Requests the Secretary General to establish contact with the governments of India and Pakistan and the true representatives of the people of Jammu and Kashmir with a view to promoting a just and peaceful settlement of the Kashmir dispute.

- 14. <u>Appreciating</u> the efforts made by the Secretary General for enabling the true representatives of the Kashmiri people to have their views expressed in OIC and other international fora, and requests him to continue to take all necessary steps in this regard.
- 15. Requests the Secretary General to send a three member OIC Fact Finding Mission to visit Jammu and Kashmir as decided by the Twentieth, Twenty-first and Twenty-second and Twenty-third Islamic Conferences of Foreign Ministers as well as the Seventh Extraordinary session and the Sixth and Seventh Islamic Summit Conferences, and to submit a report to him.
- 16. <u>Requests</u> the Government of India to allow the OIC Fact-Finding Mission to visit Jammu and Kashmir.
- 17. <u>Recommends</u> that Member States continue to coordinate their positions and to take action at the UN General Assembly and the Commission on Human Rights and other relevant international fora to promote respect for the fundamental human rights of the people of Jammu and Kashmir.
- 18. <u>Commends</u> the efforts being made by the OIC Contact Group on Jammu and Kashmir.
- 19. <u>Requests</u> the OIC Contact Group on Jammu and Kashmir to continue its efforts for promoting the right of self-determination of the Kashmiri people in accordance with the UN Resolutions and for safeguarding their fundamental human rights.
- 20. <u>Decides</u> to consider the Jammu and Kashmir Dispute at the Twenty-fifth Islamic Conference of Foreign Ministers and at the next Islamic Summit Conference.
- 21. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary General to follow up the implementation of this resolution and to present reports thereon to the Twenty-fifth session of the Islamic Conference of Foreign Ministers and the next Session of the Islamic Summit.
